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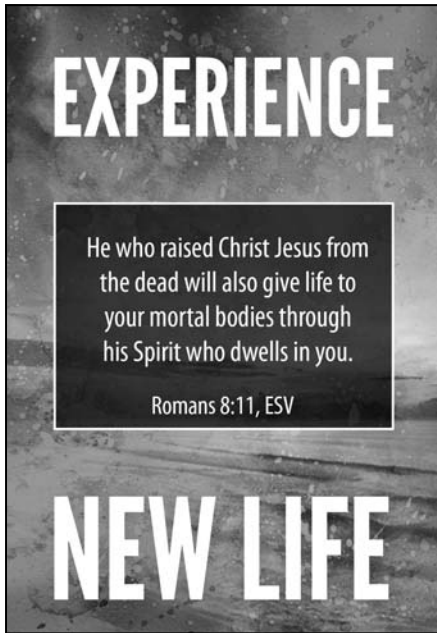

From The Pastor's Heart



The summer of 2015 is quickly coming to a close and the fall season will be here before we know it. Many of us are wrapping up vacations, preparing for school, college and moving to a different schedule to say the least. Change and the unexpected are sometimes welcomed. However, what happens when change is not expected or desired? Life becomes more difficult. Things don't always seem to happen as we would have hoped or designed them to. Many people today are looking for something more in their lives, something to place their trust and hope in.

Watching all the preparations for the Pope's arrival on September 26 - 27 in Philadelphia has been amusing at best. "Why?" we may ask. There are many reasons we could come up with. Maybe for some, because the office he holds represents a sign of hope in the current times and days we live. Others may just be curious since it's not every day the Pope comes to town. We don't need to even agree with everything he is about in order to pray for him and this special weekend. Jesus also gathered crowds looking for something more. Some were curious about Jesus, some followed and some doubted as they, too, were looking for their Messiah and hope.

Another example of people of looking for hope is in the story of Joseph. This is a story of jealousy and a dysfunctional family situation. At the end of the story, Joseph forgives his brothers for selling him into slavery in Egypt. He told them that the things they did to harm him, God intended to use for good.



In this amazing Bible story, Joseph is abused by his brothers, sold into slavery, then repeatedly scarred and neglected by his enemies. But Joseph made an amazing discovery: anything meant in this world for evil, God can use for good. This is no less true for us today. God is able to take the mess of our past and turn it into a message. He takes our trials and tests and turns them into a testimony.

Romans 8:28 does not say that all things that happen to us are good, but it does say that God is able to work all things together for the good of those who love him and are called according to his purpose. If we trust him with our broken and wounded hearts, he will bring healing, restoration, and wholeness. He takes the weak, the marginalized and the oppressed and makes all things new. What someone else would leave for broken, he sees as beautiful. And very often, the thing the enemy uses to try to destroy your life is the very thing God uses to help others. God can heal hurt and turn scars into signs of strength for his glory. Our past mistakes, hurts and pain can help give someone else a future. Whatever we have gone through enables us to help others. God doesn't waste one experience of our lives. He uses everything to help someone else. He doesn't want us to remain crippled, immobilized, or paralyzed by the past. Instead, He sent us Jesus to show us how to step into the future.

We are all broken in some way. We all have wounds. Some of us use that as an excuse to do nothing, to serve no one, but rather to sit and nurse our misfortune. That's not what God wants and not the model we see over and over again in God's Word. The Biblical model is that God deliberately chooses imperfect vessels—those

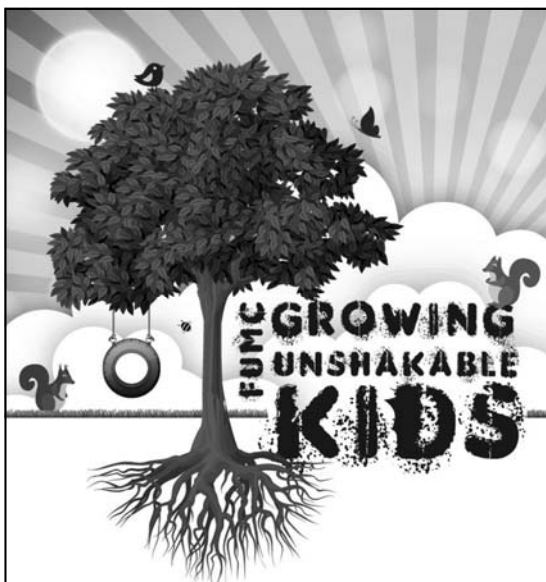
ROOTS: AN EXPLORATION OF OUR CHRISTIAN FAITH

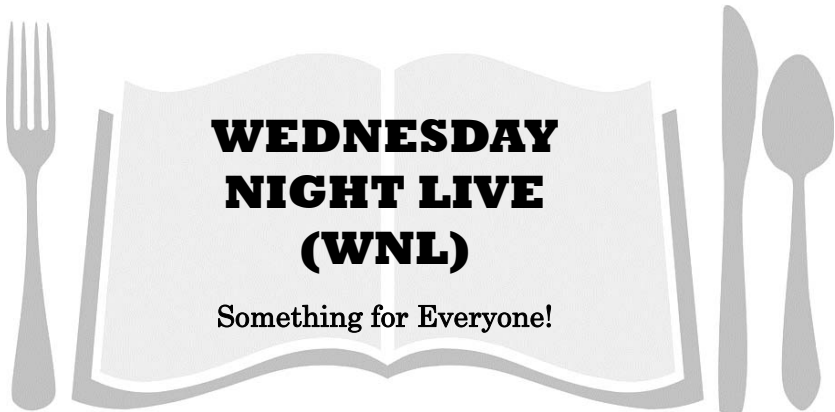
For Grades 5-8
Begins Sunday, September 13
from 9:30 – 10:30 am

*Roots: Part 1 – Redemption (God’s Story in History)
September 13 – November 15*

*Roots: Part 2 – Sanctification (God’s Story in Us)
January 10 – March 6*

Roots will give teens and tweens the opportunity to reflect on the most basic tenants of our faith and give them a safe environment to ask questions and grapple with the divine truths and mysteries proclaimed by the church of Jesus Christ. Held during the regular discipleship hour (Sunday from 9:30 – 10:30 am) this 17 week small group will help youth to investigate in depth our Christian faith and help them begin to understand what it means to become a fully devoted follower of Jesus Christ. Dinner and classes will resume on Wednesday, October 7. The remaining dates until the end of 2015 are October 14 and 21, November 4, 11 and 18. We will begin at 5:45 pm with a delicious catered dinner by a local restaurant and time of fellowship. Bible study, classes and activities for all ages will begin at 6:45 and 7:00 pm.

The adult class titles for these six week fall studies include:

Book of Ephesians – Paul wrote to promote *unity* in the Ephesian church and in the universal church and an emphasis on the importance of *love*. In addition to the church and love, Ephesians emphasizes God's action in planning, decreeing, and providing salvation, the importance of the Christian's growth in knowledge, the importance of living out one's faith consistently, and spiritual warfare. Ephesians is one of the most well-loved of Paul's epistles, because it is both very important doctrinally and extremely practical. (A folder with notes will be provided)

The Art of Marriage – Topics include: Love Happens – God's Purpose and Plan; Love Fades – Overcoming Isolation; Love Dances; Fulfilling Our Responsibilities; Love Interrupted – Communication and Conflict; Love Sizzles: Experiencing Real Intimacy; Love Always – Leaving a Lasting Legacy. (DVD based study with participant book available for purchase)

Parenting Classes – These classes are designed to assist with some of the practical essentials of parenting. A parents' greatest privilege is helping their child begin a relationship with God and building spiritual foundations a son or daughter can rely on for a lifetime.



Matthew Maher grew up achieving in every area of his life. He was a role model, active in his community, excelled in academics and athletics, earned a full scholarship to Temple University, and eventually signed a professional contract as a soccer player. Matthew's entire life was marked by good decision-making and thoughtful steps toward each of his goals.*until*.

The early hours of Saturday, March 7th, 2009, when Matthew made the fatal decision to drive while under the influence of alcohol. Traveling at a high rate of speed on the Atlantic City Expressway, Matthew struck the vehicle of 55 year-old man, a father of six children. Matthew was arrested and subsequently charged with aggravated manslaughter. Matthew's poor decision to drink and drive would tragically change many lives. In January, 2010, Matthew was sentenced to 5 years 5 months in prison, of which he served 85 percent (55 months) and was released on August 3, 2014.

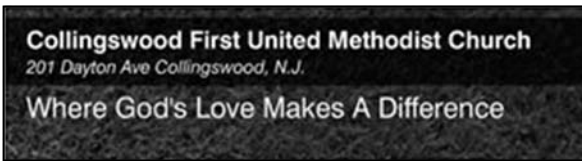
Matthew was raised in a strong Christian home and when everything around him began to crumble, he fell back on his strong foundation of faith in Jesus Christ. From the onset, he had dedicated himself to honoring the memory of his victim, by continuing the call of finding purpose in this unspeakable tragedy and holding himself fully accountable.

Matthew has experienced what it means to go from the height of success to the depths of sorrow. Thus, he began to share his prison journey by writing in a daily journal, which eventually was posted on a web site created by family and friends. The result was astounding. In the course of just the first year 80,000 people visited the site in over 98 countries and 6 continents.

He continually strives to “Be Still”, the Bible verse he clung to from the onset of his tragedy, “*Be still and know that I am God*” (Psalm 46:10). Matthew is owning his life calling by reminding people of the power of God, the power of forgiveness, the power of redemption, and distributing a message of hope that centers on the theme of “*Decisions Determine Destiny.*”

He prepares them to serve and sends them out with their weakness still in evidence, so that His strength can be made perfect in that weakness. More often than not, it's our weakness that makes us capable of serving because those we serve identify with our pain. As always, God works in us so that He can work through us. May God use us and whatever we are going through to make us stronger and encourage others. God can use anyone willing to be used. Lord, begin with me! Good: Our health permits us to arise every morning to work, both physically and mentally.

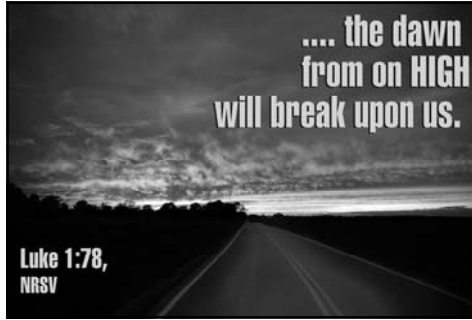
Not so Good: Arthritis in Alice’s hands and my back pains are gradually slowing us down.

Wings of Prayer



September is here and the routines of school, work, meetings and volunteer activities resume. Still in our minds are memories of vacations and other events of summer. For me, it is memories of Maine (where I am as I write this.) I am blessed to have a cabin in the woods along the coast that was built by my grandfather with pine split logs from where the cabin stands.

As I sit on the porch of the cabin, I thank God as I marvel at the awesomeness of what He has created. My first morning here God spoke to me in a way I have not heard Him before. I wonder if the messages have always been there or were they what He wanted me to know now. Maybe it has happened to you. Come with me on the start of that day.

As I awake there is a bird chirping and chirping and chirping. Doesn't it ever get tired or out of breath? Why didn't I pay attention to Mom when she told me the more common birds by their songs? This song is a wake up call. It is not just telling me to get up for the day, it is also a notice that I should pay attention to the fact that God is in EVERYTHING. God's Presence, Love and Message is more constant than the bird's chirping.

Now a woodpecker is adding his "song," if that is the right word, as he searches for food or to make a new home. His (or her) beak must be so rigid to accomplish daily tasks, day after day, month after month, year after year. Bang! Bang! Bang, bang, bang, bang into the tree trunk day in and day out. Like woodpeckers who provide

food and shelter by their hammering, God is rigid in what He has said He wants from us. He promises us an eternal home that is beyond our imagination or when we do as He commands. Like the woodpecker who very gently drops food into hungry young mouths and shelters his or her family from unwanted prey and storms, God's Love enfolds us as He provides all we need.

As the day passes, I see God in so many places. The lesson is to not only see what He provides, but look for and listen to what His message is. I should not glibly say "Thank you God" or ask "Why" so much ("Why are those birds so noisy?" "Why can't they be quiet?"), but ask "What" and "How" more. "What does the repeated chirping mean for me?" God tells and shows me over and over and over again He is with me. His Presence never goes away. "How is the woodpecker's hammering an indication of God's Love?" Christ gave us just two commandments. Follow these and He will enfold us with His Spirit, beneath the wings of His love.

Probably like you, I have asked God for answers that seem long in coming. My time in Maine has helped me in my W.A.I.T., "finding contentment in God's pauses and plans." What is this W.A.I.T.? Join others at the Women's Conference October 16 and 17 with Wendy Pope from Proverbs 31 Ministries and RTW (Reading Through the Word) to learn more. Pray for His Presence there that His Message is heard and implemented.

There is nothing in this world that God is not part of. He is as much in the cold and damp of a foggy Maine morning as He is in the colors of a sunset over the water. I must try to first look for His Presence in any situation or occurrence. He is there as much when I am happy as when I fervently pray for resolution or understanding.
